

Keeping in Touch Wesley Place Methodist Church, Alsager

Dear Friends,

For those who use the daily lectionary in the Methodist Prayer Handbook, or follow the lectionary very keenly, two important dates stand out in the coming week - 24th May, this Tuesday, is the 284th anniversary of the conversion of John Wesley, the founding father of the Methodist movement, and on Thursday, is celebrated ascension day - when the physical body of Jesus ascended to heaven ready for the Holy Spirit to come at Pentecost (crude maths gives you the 1989th ascension day, but that really is stretching history, maths, and theology!!).

As I saw both events remembered this coming week, it set me thinking. And of course pondering the question what does it have to do with us at Wesley Place?

John Wesley, and his brother Charles were, like their father eighteenth century Anglican clergy. Realising that their church at the time had lost touch with the ordinary people, they set out to preach for the miners, the dockers, the farmers, and the newly developing industrial workers of their time that the Church had lost touch with. John preached in gateways, field corners, village greens, humble houses, and even on his father's grave! Charles wrote hymns in the ordinary language of the day, many of them set to the dance tunes played in the pubs of the times. Both men grew up Christians, they were taught to read from the Bible, learnt to pray with the prayer book in their hands and at their mother Susannah's knee, went to Oxford University and learnt theology. But it wasn't until they felt the burden of their own sin that they sought the assurance of God's forgiveness, and the power of the Holy Spirit in their lives that they really took off and launched a worldwide missionary and renewal movement that today is the second largest Christian grouping in the world. (Yes, after the Catholic Church, more christians in the world today owe



their faith to the Wesleys than are part of the Anglican Communion!). Within decades of their movement taking off, it too had become respectable, and a local man - Hugh Bourne, felt the call to return to the primitive and basic Wesleyan Faith, and so Primitive Methodism was born - the first 'back to basics' campaign of the movement.

The New Testament story of Jesus is about the God of Israel, the Old Testament God appearing on earth in human form and extending his mission of over 2000 years - from Abraham and Sarah, Moses and Miriam, the prophets like Ezekiel and Jeremiah, and the stories of the temple, the desert wanderings, and exile in a foreign land - extending all of that huge story into one human person and declaring good news and deliverance to the people their religion had come

to explode with unnecessary laws and privileges - delivering forgiveness, grace, and love to all people in every time and place. The Ascension of Jesus is, if you like the popping of the cork out of the bottle, until then followers of Jesus had been confined to 1st century Palestine. With the resurrected body of Jesus ascending to heaven, the way is opened for the Holy Spirit to come at Pentecost (11 days later) and make the work of Jesus infinitely able to spread around the whole world and into every time and place. (For those who question what exactly happened - I have no idea, all history has given us is a story with a powerful meaning. What remains a question though doesn't stop us experiencing the living Christ for ourselves, or the power of the Holy Spirit in our own experience).

The first thing these two things have in common with us is Mission - they are about going out to share the liberating power of God into our day and age. John Wesley quite deliberately decided to 'be more vile' in his preaching - to go beyond and outside of the comfortable. Christianity is a missionary faith - it is for sharing. How do you feel by God to share your faith, what does it mean to you?

They also teach us the importance of personal experience. John and Charles Wesley in their preaching and hymns laid a pattern of experience for people to be 'saved'. They said all people can know that they are saved. They spoke of salvation, redemption, assurance, and perfection. Words we might find quite off putting - but they lay down the challenge for us - what is our experience of Jesus, of the Holy Spirit, what do we know of God, and how are we going and growing in our faith?

Story telling - the ascension is one of those stories that might be classed as a miracle, but which some hearers might wonder at. If we could get into a time machine and go back to see what happened - what would we see? It's a really good and honest question. But the New Testament is a book full of stories that teach us and challenge us to believe. I recently went to the cinema and watched the film 'The Northman' - a great tale of Viking revenge, Kings and invasions, royal family alliances, murder and revenge. If that's too much for you - it's the same story as the Lion King (if you're into Disney) or Hamlet (if Shakespeare is your thing). The story is about loss, human experience, feelings of regret and revenge, and how to live with them and become good and wholesome not eaten up with hatred. John Wesley made claims to have preached to crowds of thousands in venues we know could not have held that many. But the effects of his preaching are well known to many historians scholars, and theologians. The ascension is the story of our God who visited the earth taught and told and showed us the gift of life in all its fullness then returned to heaven in order to come again in a way more appropriate and powerful for all time and place. What stories do you find teach and inspire you? Which story doffed like you are a character in? Do

God's love is beyond respectability, and for the people on the edge. The Wesleys said that God's saving love was for everyone - Charles famously wrote

you want to escape or join in?

O for a trumpet voice,
On all the world to call!
To bid their hearts rejoice
In him who died for all;
For all my Lord was crucified,
For all, for all my Saviour died!

And was writing to and for a people to sing who felt excluded and left out. When I look around our Circuit, and the wider Methodist Church, those places where mission is being done are the places where people 'on the edge' (and that phrase can be read in many different ways) are being included.

Finally, forming a group together - John Wesley reckoned that his preaching had failed unless a society had been formed by his hearers - a group of people who would meet together, talk about their faith as it developed, give towards the methodist work, and bring their friends to pray and meet Mr Wesley next time he or one of his preachers passed by. In the story of the ascension Jesus spoke to 'them' and when he had gone, two angels spoke to 'them'. After it happened 'They' returned to Jerusalem to await the Holy Spirit. I was part of a fascinating conversation recently amongst some of us at Wesley Place - where some said how much they appreciated a house group or prayer group, and others said how personal their faith was, how growing and learning was an individual journey and it wasn't helpful to be shared in a group. Yet each person in that

conversation spoke of their faith as real, as shared with others in some way, and belonging to a church that both contributed to their faith, and allowed them to give in some way. What is your group? Do you want to join one? Be bold and ask! Are you frightened - summon courage and ask to join in. Are there people you don't want to be in a group with? Fine, ask to join another one! Even as an introvert, I need to share with others at times!
